
The Homecoming theme this year was Spooky Week and the dress up days included a Dia de los

Each new teacher has their own motivation for pursuing the career path they did.



Sophomore Anthony Gildone was on the JV basketball team and believes Beatty is a great coach.


"Coach Beatty is a great coach I like the way he coaches it brings everybody together and is a very helping coach," said Gildone.






Jeppsen is also notorious for his gummy bear print speedo and being the designated DJ on roadtrips.
