
The acting comes easy to the kids, primarily because they have all watched it. In fact, Mrs. Kelly Bales enjoys how well they act.


JV Softball is back in action after only having a six-week season last year. The girls have been attending open gyms in order to prepare for

This year's varsity team includes a wide variety of players. From freshmen to seniors who have never played before.





Balderas' need to learn new things shines through his music. He not only plays the flute, but he is also learning how to play the piano, saxophone, and relearn the clarinet.


