So as this chapter closes and another opens, the Class of 2025 can reminisce on the last decade and more on all that has prepared us for the future years to come.


Senior Aireona Jolliff shares her plans for after graduation, as well as many things that new students tend to face when coming into a new school.


"Same as all teachers, I think.

Overall, Jaden & coaches were surprised by his hard work and dedication to the






outlet for her.

Sophomore Juliana Jimenez says that gossiping should be kept to a minimum. Jimenez believes that it can be hurtful to the people who are being talked about.


"Sometimes people just gossip about things that aren't even important, said Jimenez. It makes me feel bad, too, because the people don't know they are being talked about.

Junior Pete Bengochea believes that an unwritten rule is not to be standing in the way of the halls when you're on your phone and not to make out in the hallways.


When people are on their phones in the hallways, standing in the way, or like when people low-key be making out in the hallways, said Bengochea. It just makes
